### President's message

We started the year with some very sad news. Past President and much-loved lighting industry figure, Liz Peck, tragically passed away at the age of 46. The industry came together to share their memories of Liz and to support each other at this sad time. She is greatly missed.

During 2021, the Society continued to provide an unparalleled programme of online events, allowing more people than ever to engage with us from around the country and around the world. Events included online talks and panel discussions, covering a hugely diverse range of topics. My personal highlights include The Vision, a talk by Kerem Asfuroglu of Dark Source about his work in a dark skies area of Ireland. Light Lessons from the Ends of the Earth, a talk about lighting on the British Antarctic Survey and a conceptual Martian habitat, and Lighting the Acropolis with Eleftheria Deko.

The SLL webinars attracted 5515 attendees over the course of the year.

In January, Sophie Parry FSLL, Chair of the SLL Technical and Publications Committee presented: Emergency Lighting - First Principles of Design, Specification and Ownership.

In February, I was joined by Zoe De Grussa who works in collaboration with the British Blind and Shutter Association and Neil McLean, European Standards Leader for Lutron Electronics to deliver the webinar: Managing Daylight and Sunlight in Buildings to Work for People. Also, the SLL & CIBSE North West with SLL Regional Representative Giorgos Kourtelis MSLL hosted the online event: DIALux Evo Update with speaker, Friedrich Bremecker, President of DIAL America Inc.

In March, the SLL hosted: Good Indoor Lighting Makes People Healthy and Happy event. I was joined by speakers: Jan Denneman, Chair of the Good Light Group and Peter Raynham FSLL, Professor of the Lit Environment, Bartlett School of Environment, Energy and Resources, Faculty of the Built Environment, UCL.

The CIBSE #GrowYourKnowledge series hosted a webinar titled What You Should Know About Lighting and Facilities

Management. The presenter was Sophie Parry FSLL, lead author of LG20: Lighting for Facilities Management.

David Mooney FSLL, SLL Regional Representative for CIBSE HCSW region presented Designing Emergency Lighting Using RIBA Plan of Work. David was also busy drafting the re-write to LG12: Emergency Lighting.

In April, Sophie Parry FSLL delivered Emergency Lighting - First Principles of Design, Specification and End-User Obligations and Lighting Guide 2: Lighting for Healthcare Premises.

We held a four-part Light Bytes series based on the theme Minimum Energy, Minimum Resource, Maximum Comfort. In each of the first three sessions, our speakers Helen Loomes (Trilux), Tim Bowes (Whitecroft) and Steve Shackleton (Zumtobel) presented, followed by a panel discussion with all three speakers. In the fourth session, we had a roundtable panel discussion on the topic of Lighting and the Circular Economy with Emilio Hernandez (Strom) and Mark Ridler (BDP) along with the other speakers from the first three sessions. In total, 892 people tuned in to these sessions and the feedback was very positive.

In May, Helen Loomes FSLL was joined by Dr Manuel Spitschan, Professor Debra Skene, Professor Timothy Brown, and Professor Steven Locklev to discuss the Recommendations for Practical Applications for Melanopic Lighting Design. This was a highly anticipated event, giving us the opportunity to hear the latest findings in the field of light and health.

The SLL collaborated with the Illuminating Engineering Society (North America) and took part in their global event Light for Life. The event topic was Moving to a Circular Economy in Lighting with speakers Bob Bohannon FSLL, SLL Immediate Past-President and Kristina Allison MSLL. Chair of the SLL Education. Committee. Bob and Kristina were the authors of CIBSE TM66: Creating a Circular Economy in the Lighting Industry.

The SLL & CIBSE West Midlands webinar: DIALux Evo and DIALux 4 - What to Use and Why was presented by lain Macrae FSLL and hosted by SLL Regional Representative Sonia Pepperrell.

SLL & CIBSE South West webinar: Luminaire Specification was hosted by Bonnie Brooks MSLL, SLL Regional Representative with Sarah Taylor: Senior Project Engineer, Fagerhult Lighting, Pete Mardell: MSLL, Senior Designer, Arup and Richard Hall: Co-Founder, Spektd.

In May, I took the reins as SLL President from Bob Bohannon. My Presidential Address was given from my spare room to an online audience, a strange but memorable experience. Whilst it was a great pity not to be able to speak to people and celebrate in person, it was a privilege to be able to speak to our members all over the country and globally. More than 100 people logged in to listen, which was wonderful.

My Address focussed on two key themes. One was about communicating the importance of light in human health to the wider world, and the other was about the makeup of SLL membership. On the first point, I want SLL to take its place as an independent and reliable source of information in what can be a sea of misinformation about how to make healthy choices with light. The second point arises from the fact that SLL membership is overwhelmingly male, but lighting as an industry has an almost 50/50 gender split, so why is that? We want our membership to reflect the sector and be more diverse as a result.

In September I was able to attend my first in-person event, taking part in a panel discussion at the Darc Room popup at Design London. I shared the stage with three other independent lighting designers, Krishna Mistry, Marcus Steffen and James Poore, and host Sarah Cullen, We discussed gender equality in the lighting profession and the then recently published results of a survey about attitudes towards gender in lighting in the UK, which was spearheaded by Carmella Dagnello of WSP, supported by myself and others. It was a very positive discussion, with plenty of audience participation and it generated a lot of ideas. As a result of this, I have continued to explore ways that we can support women in the lighting profession using mentoring and peer groups, and I will continue to build on this in the future. Having SLL represented in this forum was an important step, because it has helped to increase awareness of our work with architectural lighting designers and in particular those at the start of their career. This in turn will, I hope, lead to greater engagement with throughout all of the lighting industry, and greater representation will follow.

At the time of her death, Liz had been working on a draft Lighting Guide 21, Protecting the Night Time Environment. Benedict Cadbury very kindly took on the job of finishing off the document, and it was published in September. This document is the first step in what we anticipate to be a growing body of guidance in the near future, and we are

currently planning a larger Guide that will incorporate the latest knowledge about lighting for ecology and the night sky, with input from other bodies including the Institution of Lighting Professionals (ILP) and the International Dark Skies Association (IDA). In 2021 we began discussions to deliver a new international online conference in May 2022, Responsible Outdoor Lighting at Night with conference partner, Asst. Prof. Dr. Karolina M. Zielińska-Dabkowska.

At the end of September, I was delighted to be invited to the ILP's Build Back Better event at the House of Lords. I enjoyed spending time with ILP's President, Fiona Horgan, and we have continued to discuss future collaboration opportunities between SLL and ILP.

In October we held the In Conversation With... series. which featured unstructured conversations between various industry figures. I had the pleasure of having a conversation with Florence Lam from Arup, in which we discussed lighting for people and planet and how to reconcile the need for research into certain topics with the priorities of research organisations. Other conversations included Andrew Bissell (SLL President Elect) and Christopher Kyba, Dr Eleonora Brembilla and Dr Kynthia Chamilothori, Roger Sexton and Michael Grubb, and Dr Shelley James and Jelmer Sanders.

In December we held the SLL Young Lighter finals online. 2021 marks the 27th annual SLL Young Lighter competition and the second year that the finals have been held online. As usual the standard of participants and presentations was very high. We continue to be hugely impressed by the talent and innovation of these young people entering the lighting profession. The finalists were Maria Englezou, María Teresa Aguilar Carrasco, Remedios María López Lovillo and Verity Rose. Maria Englezou was awarded first prize for her talk entitled Do we need to change the design of healthcare facilities rooms? After the presentations, the SLL was joined by special guest speaker and SLL Young Lighter for 2018, Emma Beadle MSLL. As the judges deliberated, Emma reflected on her winning entry from 2018, Children's Utopian Visions of the City: co-designing lighting masterplans through play and exploration. Emma called upon the lighting community to share what they love and engage with the next generation of lighting professionals through creative co-design.

I would like to congratulate Andrew Bissell, who will be a great President in 2022/23. Andrew will be supported by the effective team of the President Elect and Vice Presidents to continue our great work to promote the art and science of light and lighting, for the benefit of the industry and the public at large.

# Finance report – 2021/2020 comparison

2021 proved to be another challenging and uncertain year for the the Society and the lighting industry at large.

The activities undertaken by the Society of Light and Lighting across all regions was maintained with the majority of events, as in 2020 taking place online. The Society was able to provide new and updated technical publications, research and technology programmes and educational support for all of its members and the public at large.

The most significant changes between the 2020 and 2021 accounts relate to delegate income, sponsorship and venue hire. The 2021 budget included income from sponsorship and delegate payments at in-person events. With so much uncertainty surrounding hosting in-person events the Society was unable to visit the regions as it had intended.

This loss of income was offset by controlling expenditure relating to physical events by reducing venue hire, travel and accommodation and other associated costs

The continued support of the Society's Sustaining Members and Sponsors in Partnership who delivered the spring LightBytes series enabled the final result to be a surplus of £33,322 to the overall balance of the Society.

In November, the SLL & CIBSE Home Counties North West delivered the webinar: Exterior lighting for people with Professor Steve Fotios with SLL Regional Lighting Representative, Chris Dicks MSLL and Steve Fotios FSLL, Professor of lighting and visual perception at the University of Sheffield.

The SLL was delighted to welcome the award winning Eleuthera Deko for her webinar Lighting the Acropolis.

The final of SLL Young Lighter 2021 was held online. Maria Englezou was the winner with her paper: Do We Need to Change the Design of Healthcare Facilities Rooms.

In December, the SLL hosted a webinar: Building a Martian House. Designed by specialists in the fields of space exploration, extreme environments and sustainability, the webinar asked what can we learn about lighting from the Martian House project? The speakers were: Dr Robert Myhill, from the University of Bristol, artists Ella Good and Nicki Kent and Tim Bowes MSLL, Head of Lighting Application at Whitecroft Lighting.

CIBSE TM66: Creating a Circular Economy in the Lighting Industry was launched in October and in December, CIBSE hosted a webinar as part of the Grow Your Knowledge series. Bob Bohannon and Kristina Allison gave the presentation.
